



#### DKG International Guest Phyllis Hickey, Strategic Outreach Director

Genealogy and travel are of particular interest to Phyllis, and she appeared on Family Feud with her brothers and sisters.

The Global Studies program at UW-Milwaukee is working with a new initiative through the Ghanian library system called the Youth Engagement project. Christine will talk about how this project focuses on youth, ages 14-24, who are interested in gaining knowledge and skills around career preparation and leadership, including providing "a safe and inclusive environment for young people."

Racine County Underground Railroad: A Pathway to Learn, Share, and Reflect on Americas's Obscure Past: Pauline Mitchell, Pi, retired high school educator, Racine Unified School District.

"The Underground Railroad was a secretive network of people who helped slaves escape to the northern United States, Canada, the Seminole reservation in Florida, Mexico, California and Central America to gain freedom. The network was loosely organized, but incredibly effective. To be a part of this network was to be part of a risky illegal movement. Racine County was home to some of those stations. From Racine, fugitive slaves would travel either over land or through the harbor via ship to freedom in Canada."

## **Budget Narrative**

#### By Julie Hannon, Finance Committee Chair

This newsletter contains the budget proposal for the 2023-24 fiscal year. The proposal is very similar to the current operating budget. The most significant difference is in the income section. The proposal was based on 480 active members. This is a drop of 25 members from last year at this time. Our proposed income is about \$565 less because of this drop in membership. In addition, International has eliminated all induction fees, which resulted in a small income reduction.

Our expenses have remained stable. The only significant change was a reduction on Line 6058. This item was reduced by \$200 to reflect the projected convention expenditures. But even with this modest reduction, the proposed expenditures are \$4,448 over income due to declining membership.

WSO has been able to counter this budget shortfall by using Zoom for many meetings, thus eliminating mileage. Many expenditures for 2022-23 have come in lower than budgeted amounts. In addition, our president declined her stipend for the year. So, we have yet to draw on our savings to meet our budget expenses. As more in-person activities resume, the Finance Committee and our State Treasurer will need to keep a close eye on expenses.

Thank you to committee members Barb Cody and Mary Lou Donnelly, along with Sandra Ruesink, Stephanie Malaney, and Kathleen Clouthier, for all their hard work in creating our budget proposal.

# WISCONSIN STATE ORGANIZATION 2023 STATE CONVENTION

WSO Bylaws Amendment Proposals with Rationale

#### PROPOSAL 1

#### **ARTICLE VI, Section: 4D**

#### Which now reads:

Section 4. Term of Office

D. The state treasurer shall be elected by the state Executive Board during even numbered years. She shall serve no more than three consecutive two-year terms.

#### If adopted would read:

#### Section 4. Term of Office

D. The state treasurer shall be elected by the state Executive Board during even numbered years. She shall serve no more than three consecutive two-year terms. Additional two-year terms are allowed by agreement of the state treasurer and the state Executive Board. Proviso: This change is effective July 01, 2024.

Rationale: To revise term limits for the office of Wisconsin State Treasurer, effective July 01, 2024

#### PROPOSAL 2

#### **ARTICLE VI, Section 2A**

#### Which now reads:

Section 2. Related Personnel

A. The state editor shall be appointed by the state president and confirmed by vote of the state Executive Board. She shall serve a three-year term with two successive renewals by agreement of the state editor and state Executive Board. The decision shall be determined one year in advance of renewal.

#### If adopted would read:

Section 2. Related Personnel

A. The state editor shall be appointed by the state president and confirmed by vote of the state Executive Board. She shall serve no more than three consecutive three-year terms. Additional three-year terms are allowed by agreement of the state president and state editor and confirmed by vote of the state Executive Board.

Rationale: To revise term limits for the office of Wisconsin State Editor.

ARTICLE VI, Section 2C
Which now reads:
DOES NOT EXIST

#### If adopted would read:

Section 2. Related Personnel

C. The state webmaster shall be appointed by the state president and confirmed by vote of the state Executive Board. She shall serve no more than three consecutive three-year terms. Additional three-year terms are allowed by agreement of the state president and state webmaster and confirmed by vote of the state Executive Board.

Rationale: To establish term limits for the office of Wisconsin State Webmaster.

# 2023-2025 Nominees for WSO Elected State Positions

#### President: Kathleen Clouthier (Pi Chapter)



Kathleen is nominated to serve a two-year term as 2023-2025 WSO President. She was inducted as a member of DKG in 2002. Professional Development Chair.

Kathleen has shown extensive leadership skills on the state level as she has served on the Membership Committee, Ad Hoc Leadership Committee, Nominations Committee, Financial Review, and two terms on the Finance Committee. In addition, she has served as treasurer of a WSO Convention and as WSO Vice-President.

#### Vice President: Christine Shewczyk (Chi Chapter)

#### Action Grant Committee

The Wisconsin State Organization Action Grant Committee would like to thank the five chapters who submitted Action Grant Applications by the December 1, 2022, deadline. All the Action Grant Applications were submitted digitally, and the process went very well. The Action Grant Committee would like to thank Barb Cody, WSO webmaster, for her assistance in the digital transition. These chapters are to be congratulated for planning forward-thinking projects with an emphasis on literacy: Alpha Iota-Janesville, Alpha Xi-Beaver Dam Area, Beta Alpha-Oconomowoc/Waukesha County, Psi-Northwest WI, and Zeta-Green Bay. The WSO Action Grant Committee will meet via Zoom on Wednesday, January 25, 2023, to award this year's Action Grants. A total of \$3587.92 was requested in the five Action Grant Applications. Funding available to the Action Grant Committee is \$4,500 (\$2,500 from WSO and \$2,000 from Sigma State Foundation). The Action Grant Committee would like all chapters who receive an Action Grant to know they will be notified in February of their award. To receive the grant award, chapters must submit an Action Grant Project Expense Voucher after July 1, 2023, but before May 1, 2024, along with the Action Grant Self-Evaluation Form. Chapters receiving grants must also submit a short summary of their project for the WSO newsletter during 2023-2024 and create a visual display of the project that could be displayed to WSO members at the state conference. ### Beta Alpha Action Grant

Beta Alpha has three main goals for our Action Grant. Our first goal is to help The Women's Center of Waukesha. It is a Center to help victims of domestic abuse and their families. We donate school supplies and books to the children at the Center as the literacy component of our grant. In addition, we make and fill Christmas stockings for the children. We fill them with books, sundries, and toys to give the children joy and comfort at a difficult time in their lives. Finally, we use our summertime to make blankets, mittens, hats, and scarves. This project gives us a true sense of purpose and helps us live the DKG philosophy of advancing literacy and helping those less fortunate than us.

Our second goal is to help The Hope Center, a facility to help low-income families and the homeless. We helped them by donating books, both in English and Spanish, for the children. In addition, we helped the homeless by donating socks and hand warmers to help them during our cold winters.

Our third goal was focused on the classroom. We just awarded a grant to a kindergarten teacher for a unit on storytelling using familiar books. She will be presenting to us this summer, and we are really looking forward to it. We have been very busy advancing literacy and helping those less fortunate than us. We feel this demonstrates the tenets of DKG. We appreciate the help given to us by the Action Grant Committee in fulfilling these goals.

#### Leveled Books for Little Learners

Our 2022-2023 Action Grant project, Leveled Books for Little Learners, is complete! Peggy Green facilitated our project with the kindergarten teachers at West Salem Elementary School to select, purchase, and distribute 165 books. We received a Wisconsin State Organization Action Grant in the amount of \$400 and supplemented their financial support with an additional \$200 from the Theta chapter budget.

With the completion of this grant, Theta chapter has provided leveled reading books, lesson plans, and volunteer hours to all kindergarten classes in the Onalaska, Holmen, and West Salem School Districts. We received a total of \$3072 in Action Grant funding between 2015-2023 to support this project. While Theta chapter provided additional funding for these projects, the bulk of the financial support was provided by Action Grants awarded to our chapter by the Wisconsin State Organization and Sigma State Foundation, and we are deeply grateful for their investment in the education of our students!

#### Zeta Action Grant

#### "Special Delivery" of Children's Books

Teen Parents in all of the Green Bay Area Public Schools <u>Teen Age Parent Programs</u> (**TAPP**) are receiving a "special delivery" of children's books to be used in conjunction with the classroom literacy unit. Each TAPP student will receive a bag with eight age-appropriate children's books and educational handouts. Personal notes encouraging the teens to read to their children were written by Zeta members at the December chapter meeting and are included with the books. As permitted, chapter members will volunteer and participate in the classroom literacy unit.

Bilingual Spanish and Somali books are essential as some students are new English Language Learners. In addition, the books enable grandparents to be involved in reading and learning English while honoring their heritage.

Many students did not realize the importance of reading to their children, didn't have children's books in the home, nor did they have the luxury of purchasing books in addition to providing food, diapers, clothing, and essentials for their child.

First Book Marketplace is a nonprofit organization that specializes in educational equality. Because many of the TAPP students are low income, the resources of First Book offered books at a discounted price so more titles could be purchased. Community resources were also used. Titles not available from First Book were purchased from a local independent bookstore owner, who also assisted in the selection process. In addition, a community agency donated the book bags.

All books have a label indicating the Zeta chapter of DKG provides the book: "A Book to Help Grow Your Young Reader." The goal of providing children's books is to help promote the love of reading and lifelong learning for both teen parents and their children.

#### Seasons of Literacy (Winter)

The Psi-Northwest DKG chapter received a 2022 Action Grant for "Seasons of Literacy" which provided literacy activities during each season of the year. On January 11 and 12, the chapter completed the winter season (focusing on writing) in partnership with Cumberland Elementary School by hosting children's author Lisa Bullard.

Over the two days, the author conducted writing and storytelling workshops in each grade K-4 classroom. Every student had an opportunity to have their own book (purchased by Cumberland Elementary) signed by the author!

On Wednesday evening, over 100 students and family members shared a meal as author Lisa Bullard gave a presentation on storytelling. Students then worked with their families to write their own stories. This Seasons of Literacy activity was an excellent avenue to encourage 3rd and 4th graders to enter the Mary Jo Nettesheim Literary Competition!

- Participated in a prescribed number of international conferences/conventions
- Held a certain number of specific state positions
- Been a member for a minimum number of years

- Recruit applicants
- Assist applicants in any way with the application process
- Discuss any application with anyone other than another INC member
- Support or advocate for any nominee in any way

Mental Health will be the major focus this year with the adoption of the Mental Health Resolution of 2022.

As part of the Mental Health Resolution, Ellen W. Williams, Ph.D., Psychologist presented a webinar titled, *Coping with the Blues in the Red and Green Season*. Although her presentation wasn't recorded here are some of the highlights.

The title of the presentation draws from psychologists' busiest times of the year: Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanza, and New Year's Eve.

Not all these holidays will be the picture-perfect gatherings we see in advertisements and movies. These images reinforce the misbeliefs about the perfect life. If you expect or demand the ideal, here is what might happen...

- 1. Experience feelings of anxiety, irritability, agitation, anger, impatience, frustration, and sadness.
- 2. More likely to eat more, drink more, sleep less, smoke more, use more drugs, and exercise less.
- 3. Have physical ailments of headaches, stomach distress, tense muscles, and back aches.

Experiencing any of these things can impact relationships with an increase in conflicts and fighting. Ellen had some Coping Skills suggestions. Here is her list.

- 1. Mindfulness
  - Being in the present moment
  - On purpose
  - With acceptance
  - No judgment
- 2. Gratitude
  - · Focus on what we already have
- 3. Equanimity
  - Mental calmness, composure, evenness of temper
  - Breathing exercise
  - Meditation (apps, calm, Headspace, Insight Timer)

6.	Social Media and its Importance on Mental Health	35.73%
