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## 2023 Wisconsin State Organization Convention

On May 6, Pewaukee was the place to be as DKG sisters from all over Wisconsin came together to socialize, reconnect, learn, and engage at the 2023 State Convention, *DKG LEADS: Literacy, Education, Advocacy, Diversity.* 

Those of us who arrived on Friday had an opportunity to socialize that evening in the Hospitality Room. It was a great beginning.

The convention opened Saturday morning with the WSO Business Meeting. New officers for 2023 to 2025 were elected: Kathleen Clouthier (Pi), President; Chris Shewczyk (Chi), Vice President; and Kay Ziegahn (Lambda), Secretary. Also elected were Finance Committee members: Bobbie Momchilovich (Psi), Rachel Schultz (Lambda), and Kathy Zautner (Beta Alpha); and Nominations Committee members: Nancy Herrmann (Zeta), Isabel Piana (Delta), and Julie Trafton (Pi).

Leslie Bakkum (Theta), representing the Rules Committee, presented the WSO Bylaws Amendment Proposals for the state treasurer, state editor, and state webmaster positions. The proposals were voted on and amended to allow for additional terms when mutually agreed upon.

Changes to the WSO Rules and Bylaws to comply with DKG International, as a result of voting at the 2022 International Convention in New Orleans, can be found on the WSO website, as well as the required revisions to chapter rules.

The 2023-2024 budget proposal was presented by Finance Committee Chair Julie Hannon (Omicron) and approved unanimously.

Following the Business Meeting, the program began with our International Representative, Phyllis Hickey, Strategic Outreach Director, as she congratulated WSO on our many accomplishments, including increasing membership. She also updated us on the news from International.

Phyllis installed the 2023-2025 officers.

Bobbi Momchilovich recognized the 2024 Action Grant recipients (pages 10-11), and Ellen Dowd recognized the Give Back Grant recipients (page 6).

A reflection by Mary Jane Carreno (Pi) opened the luncheon. The highlight of the luncheon was the announcement by Kathy Clouthier (Pi) of the 2023 Missling Achievement Award winner, Mary Keene (Alpha Gamma). Kathy then recognized and thanked Stephanie Malaney (Omicron) for her service to WSO over the past two years. Our own "Madam Butterfly," Bev Mantey-VanCronkhite (Delta), was recognized for her long-standing dedication and support of WSO. We are very proud of her most recent achievement, her appointment as International Northwest Regional Director. Bev represents us well. She is only the second WSO member to be honored with that position, the first being De Britt (Theta).

The luncheon concluded with WSO Literary Co-Chair Donell Bonetti introducing the 2023 Nettesheim Award recipients.

Panel by Bobbi Momchilovich (Psi), Ellen Dowd (Beta Alpha), and Laura Muchowski (Beta Alpha). There was indeed something for everyone.

Lively bidding on baskets this year yielded \$100 each as the winning bid for Beta Alpha and Zeta donated baskets. Which chapter will top that amount at the next basket auction? # 2023 Missling Achievement Award Recipient Dr. Mary Kenne



We are pleased to announce that Dr. Mary Kenne (Alpha Gamma) is the recipient of the prestigious 2023 Lorraine Missling Achievement Award. Because of her warm personality and attention to detail, Mary has united members in many leadership roles in Delta Kappa Gamma and the educational community. Her professionalism shines in her knowledge of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International and in sharing this information with our membership.

Mary has been a member of Delta Kappa Gamma since 1994 and has served Alpha Gamma as secretary for five terms and president for four terms. She has been instrumental in supporting

efforts by chapter members to attain an ongoing funded scholarship at the local university endowment office. This fund provides a \$1000 scholarship each year to a university student in the field of education. In addition, when members expressed an interest in building and stocking Little Free Libraries, she supported the idea and helped implement three Little Free Libraries. Mary has kept the chapter apprised of opportunities that will help stimulate personal and professional growth. Our members look up to her as a leader to consult with on educational issues, Delta Kappa Gamma principles, and anything else needed to make the chapter successful.

As WSO President during the pandemic, Mary worked to keep us connected. She did not allow the stresses of the pandemic to interfere with her objectives. Zoom became an essential means of communication. She pioneered the first WSO online convention with great ease and success. Mary guided and energized significant revisions of the state constitution. She led the charge to hold the state convention as a well-organized, highly focused one-day event rather than the previous, more expensive overnight convention. On the state level, Mary has served on the Nominations Committee and Sigma State Foundation, as well as sharing her talents as Treasurer and Leadership Chair.

In Mary's role as principal, her ability to handle challenges without losing her calm demeanor and cheerfulness helped others see a leader who was able to think things through and make progress toward a successful conclusion. She provided a great example that helped others understand they, too, could advance in education and make a difference to students. In addition, she championed causes that would improve her teachers' goals.

Alpha Gamma sisters say of Mary, "She has a huge heart, a generous spirit, and an inspiring personality. No award can capture all she means to everyone with whom she is involved. She is a hard worker that doesn't expect recognition but truly deserves it."

#### **DKG State Literary Competition ~ 2023**

This all began, 39 years ago, in 1984 with Mary Jo Nettesheim initiating the writing competition for grades 3, 5, and 7. The goal was to raise the awareness of Wisconsin's DKG organization. She was an enthusiastic 6th grade teacher who probably did not know the impact that she was creating. This year:

- 783 students in the state participated by submitting their books to a local chapter
- 147 chapter members were involved
- 109 books were submitted to the state-level competition from 15 chapters in Wisconsin
- 16 DKG members from several chapters throughout Wisconsin came together to judge the submissions on March 18.
- 46 students received a state-level award for their work and were honored at the May 6 WSO Convention

There are so many people to thank for making Mary Jo's dream continue to happen. Whatever part you may have played with influencing the literary work of Wisconsin's students, it was important, impactful, and influential. Thank you!

### Remembering De Britt

On a cold, rainy Saturday at the end of March, North Presbyterian Church in La Crosse, Wisconsin, radiated with the love and respect our community felt for Deloris Vivian Britt. The sanctuary was filled with members of her family, former students, friends from church, colleagues from the educational community, her Eastern Star sisters, and her Delta Kappa Gamma sisters from Theta chapter and Wisconsin State Organization.

Seated in the middle of the congregation was the Thao Family. During the service, Nou Chee shared a moving remembrance on behalf of the family. With words, tears, and humility, she talked about their love and respect for their *Teacher De*. When Yia Yang Thao and Samuel Ning Sou Thao arrived in La Crosse in 1979 as part of the Hmong resettlement, De taught them to read. What blossomed from that teacher/student interaction was a special relationship that influenced the lives of Yia Yang and Samuel Ning Sou Thao and the ten (10) children and fifteen plus (15+) grandchildren that blessed their marriage. Deloris took the children shopping for school supplies, shoes, clothes, and winter gear and never missed celebrating family birthdays and holidays with gifts. She was actively involved in their lives. De and Franklin provided the guidance, love, and support only a family can provide. The lives of three generations of the Thou family were influenced by the friendship and unconditional love of their *Teacher De*.

De's obituary tells the story of her life, her intelligence, and her journey as a high school educator from Black River Falls to UW-La Crosse, to Bangor, and finally to La Crosse Central High School. It tells us about her interests, community involvement, and sixty-one (61) year membership in Delta Kappa Gamma. It tells us what she accomplished in her well-lived ninety-seven (97) years on this earth. Obituary link: Deloris Vivian (Jandt) Britt Obituary

The real story of Deloris Vivian (Jandt) Britt is not in what she accomplished but in who she was; a generous and independent woman with a dry sense of humor and a touch of "sass" and an extraordinary educator who was interested and actively involved in the lives of her students. She was our beloved Teacher De.

June 3, 1925 - March 24, 2023

De was inducted as a member of Theta chapter, Wisconsin State Organization, in April 1962. During her 61 years of membership, she has exemplified the Mission, Vision, and Purposes of DKG, serving as Wisconsin State Organization President (1979-1981), Northwest Regional Director (1984-1986),



and DKG Educational Foundation Trustee (1994-2000). In addition, she compiled *The Delta Kappa Gamma Educational Foundation A History*, published by the DKG Educational Foundation in July 2000. In 1993, Deloris received the Dr. Lorraine Missling Sigma State (WI) Achievement Award. She remained an active and cherished member of Theta chapter until her death.

#### **2023-2024 Recipients**


Congratulations to the following chapters for their innovative projects:

- Pi chapter was awarded funding to provide scholarships to six students, ages 6-14, to attend the Eco-Justice Center in Racine County. The center is an environmental and organic farm center that promotes healthy ecosystems and sustainable growing practices.
- Omicron chapter was given funding to provide shelving, bins, and other storage to store food, clothing, and school supplies for the Community School Center at Jefferson Elementary School. The Center helps reduce educational barriers for disadvantaged students.
- Alpha Gamma chapter was given funding to purchase a microphone to help promote the arts through the Whitewater School District Theater Program. Students in grades five through seniors participate in the program.
- Alpha Beta chapter was awarded funds to assist a teacher at Slinger High School. Funding will help
  pay for speakers and transportation to teaching sites. He is teaching a CAPP (Cooperative Academic
  Partnership Program) class.
- Chi chapter was awarded funding to offer five teachers a grant to be used for a classroom or schoolwide project. Compliance with a mini-grant requirement to not use for literacy purposes would be monitored.
- Beta Alpha chapter was given funding to offer a scholarship to one senior high school student to attend a leadership camp put on by WASC (Wisconsin Association of Student Councils).

## Key Women Educators Celine Wong

Celine Wong, a Delta member for 25 years, was featured on the Interactive Board at the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre during the February 7 to March 19 run of "The Heart Sellers" which shares the challenges of two Asian women who adjust to life as wives of resident doctors who immigrated to the United States during the shortage of healthcare workers.

This Interactive Board features the experiences of Asians who immigrated to the United States in the 1960s and 1970s. Celine's "Accepting Who You Are" is her immigration reflection recorded in a youth voice. We are proud that Celine was chosen and consented to share her thoughts about the importance of "Accepting Who You Are." Celine was born in China and emigrated from Hong Kong to the United States in 1962. She decided to come to the United States because there was only one university in Hong Kong. But first, she had to be accepted by a college to receive permission to enter the States. Mount Mary College, now a university, recognized her potential and offered her the opportunity to study here.

The Chinese/Asian population, on the whole, was still relatively small in Milwaukee when she arrived. Midwesterners wondered what her nationality was. Celine surprised many with her English, Chinese, Shanghainese, and French fluency. Her new friends took her to sample Milwaukee's "Chinese" cuisine, like chop suey, egg foo young, and fortune cookies. However, she only heard of these foods once she arrived here. Most people should have realized that there were many trained chefs in the European tradition in Hong Kong, and Celine was familiar with European pastries and other delicate dishes.

However, there was a period of acclimation, as evidenced by a classmate's story: "One day, early in our friendship, Celine came to my room and announced she was going on her first American date. It was a blind date, and she was concerned about what to wear. So we went through her closet and chose an outfit we thought was nice. Then we discussed what the date might be like and do's and don't's. Girl

talk! After the young man arrived on the night of her date, she came to my room. I opened my door. There she was, looking fabulous in her FULL-LENGTH mink coat! I went to MY closet, took out my cloth coat, and said, 'Celine, he will pass out if you meet him in a mink coat. Wear this!' I handed her my cloth coat. She was not used to sharing clothes with other people, and probably many other things must have gone through her mind as she chose to go down in the mink coat. She started elegantly down the stairs. Halfway down, she told the young man she'd be right back. We exchanged coats. Then off she went on her first American date in a cloth coat! After her date, she came to my room and told me she had had a VERY nice time, and we both laughed so hard!!! I knew then that however badly I advised her on life in America, she would take it with her natural grace and classiness, and we would LAUGH." By Jeane Fleck

Celine's life was full after graduating with a B.A. from Mount Mary College, marriage, the birth of her two sons, work, and pursuit of her teaching license. She became a teacher, working in parochial schools and then for Milwaukee Public Schools, as a regular and special ed teacher with mostly middle school students.

Today, Celine shares her time and talents with her grandchildren and the many elderly citizens she cares for. This work has brought her much personal satisfaction. She also is a patron of the arts and enjoys many different art forms. For many years, she helped staff the Information Booth at the onceannual Mount Mary Starving Artist Show. She continues to share her interest in various cuisines. And she loves working with international groups. Her history background helps her relate with many people from around the world. But, most of all, she continues to be an enduring friend and is always willing to help old and new friends in many ways



### Wisconsin State Organization Committees Working for You

#### **Action Grant Committee**

The WSO Action Grant Committee has been hard at work revising the "2023 Action Grant Application for Projects in 2024-2025" and the "Rubric for WSO Action Grant Evaluation." Both forms can be found on <a href="https://dx.doi.org/dkgwso.weebly.com">dkgwso.weebly.com</a>. Click on Action Grants, and all the necessary forms regarding Action Grants will be there! In addition to the Action Grant Application, you will find the "DKG-Wisconsin State Organization Action Grant Writing Handbook." This handbook contains hints on writing a successful grant as well as a page of "action verbs" that can be used in writing SMART Goals. The "2023 Action Grant Application for Projects in 2024-2025" is due on or before December 1, 2023, to the Action Grant Chair. Once an Action Grant is awarded, the "Action Grant Expense Voucher" with receipts attached and the "Action Grant Self-Evaluation Form" must be submitted to the Action Grant Chair on or before May 1, 2025. In addition to these requirements, Action Grant recipients must write an article for the WSO newsletter during 2024-2025 and present a display about their project at the 2025 Convention.

Action Grants were first awarded in 2005 to provide "seed money" for chapters to initiate a program in their schools and/or communities. Later, a literacy component became a requirement for the Action Grant. Funds requested through Action Grants must be used for literacy materials and cannot be used for speaker fees, service fees, travel or lodging expenses, or refreshments. As of 2022, 30% of the total amount of funds requested must come from supplemental monies from the chapter and/or community resources to show support for the project.

During the WSO State Convention presentation, the Action Grant Chair presented the following "Advice from Action Grant Self Evaluations." This is a compilation of the advice submitted by chapters with successful Action Grant projects as reported on the "Action Grant Self-Evaluation Form."

#### **Advice About the Application**

- \* Follow the application carefully.
- \* Use the Action Grant Handbook and follow the SMART Goals.
- \* Review of the grant writing tips on the WSO website, along with looking at past approved grants, is very useful.
- \* Plan ahead and make sure you have a literacy component to your application.
- \* Make sure the applicants are flexible and have a contingency plan. Have alternatives to timelines and goals.
- \* Keep the outcome in mind while doing this.
- \* Include as much detail in your application as possible, knowing adjustments can always be made.

#### **Advice About the Chapter**

- \* Choosing a project that your members can work on throughout the year is a great way to keep members interested and active.
- \* Take advantage of this opportunity to increase literacy by writing a grant. Have teaching members share their expertise in selecting pertinent projects.
- \* If you don't apply for a grant, you will not have the opportunity to create a future project for the chapter. It was exciting!
- \* Make the completion of the Action Grant Application a team effort. Including chapter members and the grant recipient is helpful.
- \* Having funds for project implementation is important for getting the receipts needed for grant money reimbursement.
- Promote the project idea with the chapter members before writing the proposal.
- \* Start discussing the grant idea at the first meeting of the year. Look at the need for literacy in the community.

- \* Don't be daunted by the paperwork. Get several members together and work through the application. Remember that you are teachers, and your grant can make a difference in students' lives in your area.
- \* Have a specific goal and get as many members involved as possible.

#### **Advice About the School and Community**

- \* Become involved with the service groups in the community to assist with project funding.
- \* Keep in touch with the public library to know the literacy needs in the community.
- \* Look at what's happening in the community where many people are involved and put a literacy component to it.
- \* If you're working at a school, have a strong, supportive staff person involved in the grant.
- \* Make personal contact with the community agencies supporting the project so that they understand completely what the project goals are and what DKG is all about.
- \* Look at existing community activities and discuss how the chapter could add a literacy component to what is already happening.

An informational Zoom Meeting will be open to all members on Thursday, October 26, 2023. A WSO Action Grant Committee member will present information on how to write effective evaluation questions as part of the Action Grant application. There will also be time for questions and answers about the application process. Notice of this meeting will be sent to all chapter presidents.

The following chapters were notified in February that they received an Action Grant and are to be congratulated for planning forward-thinking projects with an emphasis on literacy:

The Wisconsin State Organization Bylaws and Standing Rules have been revised to reflect action at the 2023 WSO State Convention. This revision reflects changes to the term limits for the offices of state treasurer and state editor and a new term limit for the office of state webmaster. Additional revisions, necessitated by changes in the DKG International Constitution and Standing Rules are also reflected in Wisconsin State Organization Bylaws and Standing Rules, Amended May 2023. The document was distributed to all members of the WSO 2023-2025 Executive Board and is published on the state website.
