Tech Tip #3

How to print a web page without the ads and other 'junk'

Here is the one of the latest tech hints from Rick's Daily Tech Tips: https://www.ricksdailytips.com/print-friendly/

Have you ever tried to print a web page only to end up with a printed page that was difficult to read because of all the clutter?

Ads, header logos, photos and other types of "extra" content are usually quite acceptable when viewing a web page in your browser, but they can be a pain in the neck when you want to print the page.

Luckily, there's a fantastic free service called **Print Friendly** that will let you quickly and easily print just the text (and optionally the photos) that appears on any web page. Here's how to use it:

1 – Right-click on the Web Address, then click **Copy**.

2 – Visit <u>www.printfriendly.com</u>. (Note: I recommend that you bookmark this page so you can load it quickly when you need to print a web page.)

3 - Paste**the web address you just copied**into the text box, then click the**Preview**button. You should now see a stripped-down version of the page.

5- Click the **Print** button to send the stripped-down web page to your printer.


6 –You can also **convert the page to a PDF document.**

Now you can print just the content you want on any web page without printing all the "junk" along with it!

FYI: I used this tech tip to take out all of the extra "stuff" on Rick's page.

The printscreen of the webpage shows the print, PDF and email choices. The text has been changed to 90% and the image box has been changed to zero to

remove all images. Clicking in the text will show a delete symbol, which can be used to delete text not wanted.

Tech Tip Number 2

How do you insert horizontal lines into a document?

As I was going through some tech tips for the next Monday Membership Minute, I came across this tip.

If I had known this a week ago, I could have used this. This only works with Microsoft Word with AutoFormat feature turned on.

When you type certain characters three times on their own line and then press Enter, those characters instantly become a horizontal line.

- Place the cursor where you want to insert the horizontal line. It must be at the beginning of the line.
- Type three of the characters listed here, and then press Enter.

Below shows an example of the lines available.

Three hyphens --Three equal signs === Three underlines ____ Three asterisks *** Three number signs ### Three Tildes ~~~

The line is inserted for the full width of the page. When inserted into a column, the line is inserted to match the width of the column. To add text above the line, put your cursor where you want the text and begin typing.

Tech Tip #1 ---- for Chromebook Users:

Where is the Delete Key?

Luckily, Google does provide a way to delete the character after the cursor, but you have to press two keys instead of one...

The 'Backspace' key works the same as it does on Windows PCs and Macs. Pressing it will delete the character that's located immediately before the cursor.

To delete the character that's located immediately after the cursor you'll need to press **Alt + Backspace** keys.

Where is the Caps Lock Key?

For whatever reason, Google decided to do away with the Caps Lock key and replace it with a Search key.

You'll find the Search key on the far-left side of the keyboard, right above the Shift key. It has a little magnifying glass icon on it.

To turn on the Caps Lock, press the **Alt + Search** keys, then press **Alt + Search** to turn off the Caps Lock.

Conference update.

There is a bit of a change on one of the presentations. I would like to highlight this as an option for you. The synopsis of the presentation by Megan Schliesman, librarian from CCBC is below.

It's a Matter of Choice: Books for Everyone, Not Every Book for Everyone at Your Local School and Public Library

School and public libraries have a responsibility to meet a wide range of reading needs and interests, and to reflect many different identities and experiences of people in their communities and the wider world. Books and other materials available in a school or public library collection are intended to offer choices for everyone in the community they serve. And because everyone is different in their tastes and experiences and interests, those choices include books in many genres and formats, about many topics and many kinds of people, both real and imagined (not to mention animals and inanimate objects!) How do libraries choose books? And why do they choose books that some people inevitably find offensive? This session will talk about the how and the why, including the importance of intellectual freedom to libraries, schools, and the people in the community they serve. It will also touch on the recent increase in public attacks and challenges to materials in libraries and schools.

Mentorship is a topic that recently arose at an Educational Excellence Regional meeting. As members, we are expected to mentor others in our Society as well as educators in our communities. This is so important it is listed as the first Focus Area of the Society's Strategic Plan. Committee chairs shared the difficulty chapters are having accessing schools and connecting with educators, let alone mentor new educators. As leaders we have asked for the topic to be explored and a common set of directions that members could follow to set up mentoring programs for our State Organizations to share.

Working together, Chi Membership and EE committee members created an alternative approach for supporting educators. With the aid of a *Give Back Grant* they developed a program that would be of interest to educators. An elementary school principal shared insights gained by her district's educators as they met the challenges of 2020 to the present. Committed to the growth of every student the district worked cooperatively to meet students' needs. Educators who attended the presentation were grateful for the information they received. The event raised the visibility of DKG, WSO, and the chapter.

The March 4th article <u>Creating a Good Mentoring Relationship</u> on the DKG Blog has addressed who we are expected to mentor, what mentoring could address, and suggestions for how to mentor educators. What remains to be addressed is methods for introducing ourselves to District educators and administrators in our communities to share the support we could provide. Hopefully, we will hear valuable ideas in the near future.

- Reach out to the women who have dropped membership. For example, do you have members who would be willing to rejoin your chapter to take part in the friendships or a project that you do in your chapter? This is an example of a way to help your chapter grow.

Creating a list of work made it easier to see where our efforts were and thus led to evaluation of their focus in relation to Purpose and member personal needs.

One area left unaddressed by the large group is individual personal needs. It is important for each of us to look at our own unique set of needs that must be met for us to be at our best. When we meet our personal needs in ways that are satisfying, life is good.
